

Bach's Muse: The Goldberg Variations

COURSE DESCRIPTION

What is the nature of creativity? How does limitation spark generation? What does 250 year-old music have to do with John Coltrane? In this class, we will explore these questions and more through J.S. Bach's keyboard masterwork, the "Goldberg" Variations. Together, we will ask what makes the piece tick—how Bach took a simple idea and ran with it to conjure thirty different worlds. Students will dive into the music and its history, unpacking key musical elements, while also learning about the context in which Bach wrote the music—the Baroque era, and Bach's own rocky life course. Then, we'll follow the piece into the present, where it continues to inspire artists around the globe. Students similarly inspired will have the opportunity to create their own variation in any medium. Open to all.

PREREQUISITES

There are no prerequisites for this class – the course is open to musicians and non-musicians alike and assumes only an openness to learning about Bach and his music, not any prior knowledge.

COURSE CALENDAR

Week 1 – Origin Story: The Baroque Era and the *Goldberg* Myth

Topics: Bach's early years and musical influences; introduction to the *Goldberg Variations*, including their structure, and the tale behind why Bach wrote them.

Week 2 – Faith and Fireworks

Topics: Bach's prowess as a musician and an improviser; links to contemporary jazz; role of faith in Bach's composition.

Week 3 – Tragedy and Inspiration

Topics: Bach’s experience of loss, and the role of his music as a source of solace and inspiration for others across centuries.

- **Before class, listen to:**
 - *Goldberg Variations*, 16-25
 - Variation 25 is often considered the heart of the Goldbergs. For that reason, I highly recommend listening to multiple interpretations of this key part of the piece.

Week 4 – At Play

Topics: Bach’s lighter side, and how mirth and play show up in the Goldbergs and other works by Bach. Guest speaker Anne Bellas, an art quilter from Nantes, France, will join remotely to

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discuss her work creating 32 quilts inspired by the variations. [Explore her work and portfolio here.](#)

LISTENING

Many artists have recorded the *Goldberg Variations*, and I would encourage you to listen and compare multiple. Below are a number of high-quality recordings available that I recommend. If you're looking for a place to start, try Ólafsson's or Schiff's versions. Each recording contains a hyperlink to access the recording directly.

- Vikingur Ólafsson, 2023 ([available on Spotify](#)) – A recent recording by a respected modern Bach interpreter.
- Andras Schiff, 2017 ([available on Youtube](#)) – Another recent recording by a highly respected interpreter, with the benefit that it includes video.
- Mahan Esfahani ([available on Spotify](#)) – A recent, high quality recording on harpsichord by a dynamic young harpsichordist.
- Kimiko Ishizaka, 2014 ([available on Youtube](#)) – Recording with score accompaniment for those who want to follow along while listening.
- Simone Dinnerstein, 2007 ([available on Spotify](#)) – A revelatory recording with a very different, empathic approach. This recording launched Dinnerstein's career.
- Glenn Gould, 1981 ([available on Youtube](#)) – A legendary, idiosyncratic recording with accompanying video. This recording was completed shortly before his death at age 50. Gould's first recording of the piece, in 1955, launched his career and is vastly different ([available on Spotify](#)).
- Wanda Landowska, 1999 ([available on Spotify](#)) – An influential early recording by the Polish-French harpsichordist.

FURTHER STUDY

For a portrait of Bach's life, character, and overviews of his musical output, I highly recommend John Eliot Gardiner's book, *Bach: Music in the Castle of Heaven*.
